Elements:

1. Identify the key elements of community risk management across community conditions.
2. Use community risk management terminology in specified community risk situations.

Prerequisites: None.

Assessment Conditions: For the purposes of assessment, candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge of community risk management issues in their local community.

Special Notes: The term *community risk management* is used to describe a methodology that can be applied to manage natural and manmade conditions that present risk or danger to the public, property, commerce, or the environment. The reference for community risk management is AS/NZS 4360:1999.

Assessment Brief Instructions:

Assessing Element 1: Identify the key elements of community risk management across community conditions

Community conditions include but are not limited to:

- socio-economic variables
- environmental factors
- community structures and types
- human behaviour

Candidate ensures community conditions are identified in the local community.

Candidate ensures the key elements of community risk management outlined in AS/NZS 4360:1999 are identified.

Candidate ensures community risk management is identified in relation to community conditions.

Assessing Element 2: Use community risk management terminology in specified community risk situations

Candidate ensures explanations of the common terms used in community risk management are given in specified community risk situations.

Candidate ensures risk management terms used for specified community risk situations express key community risk management elements. These must include:

- emergency risk management
- environment
- hazards
- lifelines
- likelihood
